

Meetings with the Ambassador of the Republic of Lithuania to Japan and Honorary Consulate of the Republic of Lithuania in Gifu | May 31 and June 2

n May 31, Vice President KAMBARA Shinji and Professor MOURI Tetsuya held a meeting with the Honorary Consulate of the Republic of Lithuania in Gifu, Mr. MURASE Yukio. They also met with the Ambassador of the Republic of Lithuania to Japan, Dr. Aurelijus Zykas in Tokyo on June 2.

Currently, Gifu University¹⁾ has exchanged agreements with Vytautas Magnus University (VMU,concluded in 2012) and Kaunas University of Technology (KTU,concluded in 2010) in Lithuania. These universities continued to engage in various exchange activities even during the coronavirus pandemic. Moreover, a "Lithuania Study" course is being offered to students in GU to help them become familiar with Lithuania.

In both meetings, GU representatives reported about seven GU members' visits to VMU and KTU in March 2023 to discuss the launch of a new joint degree program²⁾ with VMU, and the continued partnership with KTU. In a meeting with Mr. Murase, they talked about future collaboration between universities and business communities. In Tokyo, his Excellency, Dr. Zykas, and the GU staff shared their views on reinforcing friendships between Lithuania and Gifu University.

GU continues to build a strong bond with Lithuania, whose long-standing partnership started with the Japanese diplomat, SUGIHARA Chiune³ from Yaotsu Town, Gifu Prefecture.

2) A joint degree program (JDP) offers an international graduate school-level education that enables students to complete their master's or PhD studies while being enrolled in GU and its overseas partner universities. A joint diploma is conferred to a student from GU and its overseas partner university.

3) SUGIHARA Chiune (January 1,1900 - July 31, 1986)

A Japanese diplomat who served as Vice-Consul for the Empire of Japan in Lithuania. During World War II, he helped thousands of Jews leave Lithuania by issuing transit visas so that they could travel to Japanese territory, risking his career and his family's lives.

In a meeting with the board members (President YOSHIDA Kazuhiro, Vice President SUGIYAMA Makoto, Vice President KAMBARA Shinji , and Executive Director KOYAMA Hiroyuki of GU-GLOCAL¹), the Ambassador was first introduced to the university. They discussed the natural environment, energy development, major businesses and industries, and higher education in Morocco. At the end of the meeting, they agreed to build a strong new partnership between GU and universities in Morocco.

After the meeting, the Ambassador was invited to inspect two research facilities on campus: the Intelligent Production Technology Research & Development Center for Aerospace and the Institute for Glyco-core Research (iGCORE). We strongly hope that the Ambassador's visit to GU marks a significant step in

initiating active interactions among students and faculty in the two countries.

Spring School Program 2023

n collaboration with IITG¹, GU-GLOCAL has offered GU students a Spring School Program. Ten selected students took part in the program at IITG from March 3 to 14, 2023.

While studying at IITG, GU students visited Kaziranga National Park (one of the biggest parks in Assam), a folk museum, and a Bhutanese-style temple to understand the great diversity of Indian culture. They were also invited to meet a seed farmer and inspect a confectionary factory or a tea plantation. On campus, students participated in a workshop to learn how to utilize bamboo resources. They also had the opportunity to visit laboratories in JDP-related departments.

During "Holi" (the festival of colors), GU students observed the distinctive culture of northeastern India and enjoyed mingling and interacting with local students.

On the final day, March 14, GU students gave a poster presentation and answered questions in English. All the students successfully completed the program and received certificates of completion.

Subsequently, students who participated in summer school programs, studied abroad as exchange students, or went overseas on the Valor and V Drug Overseas. They mentioned their improved language skills, discoveries of different values and friendships. They also said that

their invaluable experiences helped them grow and mature into responsible members of society.

After the meeting, some students continued asking questions about the study abroad programs and enquired about the senior students' experiences abroad.



Orientation for Crisis Management when Traveling Abroad

he "Orientation for Crisis Management when Traveling Abroad 2023" was held to raise awareness amongst university students and staff members planning to go abroad concerning the risks of accidents or crimes, and how to avoid becoming a victim.

First, Dr. YAMAMOTO Mayumi, Director/Professor of the Health Administration Center spoke about the necessary mental and medical preparations before going abroad. This was followed by a speech by Mr. HATTORI Makoto, former chairperson of the Japanese Council for the Safety of Overseas Students concerning how to stay vigilant during a crisis and protect themselves from harm.

Finally, information on risk management support desks and travel insurance programs was shared with the audience.

Students learned a lot about accidents/crimes that actually occurred overseas, safety information from other countries, and a comparison of medical systems and insurance programs between Japan and the rest of the world.

Summer School 2023

Seven students from three universities (Northern Kentucky University [USA], National University of Malaysia [Malaysia], and Guangxi University [China]) attended school in 2023. In addition to their studies on Japanese, they visited two cities in Gifu Prefecture. The first is Seki City, where students observed traditional sword forging. The other is Gujo City, which is famous for traditional midsummer bon dancing. Students listened to local people talk about the dance. They also had the

opportunity to attend the Nohgaku workshop and learned to make ice cream at a farm. All students stayed in a shared-room unit of U • TOPIA LAND¹, with the support of

Japanese volunteers.

Gujo Dance is a significant intangible folk cultural asset in Japan and a UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage. The workshops were held every year from 2012 to 2019 but were suspended because of the outbreak of the coronavirus pandemic.

Students demonstrated smooth performances after practicing for approximately 90 minutes. Even those struggling to master unique movements were encouraged by the following words of the instructors, "It is not a matter of being good or bad. Enjoying dancing with big smiles is what this workshop is all about." Inspired by their words, the participants relaxed and began to enjoy moving well into the music.

Ten students were chosen as "Best Performers" for their strong passion and sincere efforts at dancing.

Language and Culture (CJLC) Nohgaku Workshop for International

The CJLC hosted the "Nohgaku Workshop for International and Japanese Students 2023" on July 5. The CJLC has hosted workshops since 2005, inviting professional Nohgaku actors. The following four professional actors were invited to the workshop as instructors: Mr. MIKATA Madoka and Mr. TAMOI Hiromichi who performs in Noh drama as the main actors called "shite" at Kanze School, and Mr. SHIGEYAMA Chuzaburo and Mr. YAMAGUCHI Koudo, who are Kyogen drama performers at Okura School.

After the workshop, many positive comments were made by the participants; "Instructors are kind and their lectures are very informative. I enjoyed the workshop a lot." "I had many questions about Nohgaku. I hope we can have more time to ask questions to the instructors next time."

n April 5, an orientation for the "International Joint Department of Food Science and Technology between Indian Institute of Technology Guwahati and Gifu University (Master's program)" was conducted for three newly enrolled GU students and four IITG students.

JDP students are enrolled in both GU and its overseas partner universities, and study at partner universities for the months required to complete their studies (program full-term: two years). Students attend classes, engage in research activities overseas, and study to obtain an international joint degree from GU and partner universities without extending their enrollment term.



Three GU students studied at GU from April to mid-July in 2023 and at IITG for five months from late July.

Conversely, four IITG students studied at GU for five months from April to late August 2023. They attended classes and conducted research activities in laboratories under the supervision of the GU academic staff. They also had the opportunity to participate in internship programs offered by Japanese companies.

GU and IITG students studied together face-to-face at GU by mid-July to pursue the common goal of obtaining an international joint degree.

Collaborative Video Making Program 2022

December 2022 to March 2023



S tudents from three universities (GU [nine students], IITG [four] and UKM [one]) formed four groups and worked together to create video footage for three months starting in December 2022. Under the instructions of the Australian production agency, members of each group did their utmost to produce attractive videos on the given theme, "Think about SDGs¹." On March 10, the final competition of the Collaborative Video Making Program (CVMP) was held

On March 20, GU-GLOCAL hosted the "Gifu University JDP Consortium¹⁾ First Study Meeting: How to use bamboo resources." The meeting was held to facilitate information-sharing among Japanese companies interested in bamboo resources and expand the bamboo business in India. Members of the Japan International Cooperation Agency and representatives of 19 Japanese companies attended the meeting.

At the meeting, those invited to the IITG seminar held in India in March 2023 spoke about the presentations they made at IITG. GU representatives proposed the formulation of a new framework for business-government-academia collaboration in Japan and India. Special ceramic products that can be used to bio-businesses were also unveiled.

The participants actively exchanged their views on the future of bamboo resource utilization and collaboration with India.

GU-GLOCAL continues to host study meetings and looks forward to welcoming your participation.
